soon. I don't know as it is best to write a great deal  
about our Beloved departed Ellen, it is not best  
perhaps for me to trouble the wound in your hearts,  
which I trust by the grace of God is pearted to you  
is in some good measure healed. I too am afflicted  
no grand Father could be more deeply afflicted  
in the departure of a loved One than I am  
When I go into the yard in front of the house  
there is a gloom — Ellen used to be with me  
then — When I went to milking she  
was with me, Oh! no more  
at present! — God has Redemmed

has taken his own to himself. Oh how  
happy she must be; that bright Intellect  
eternally increasing in brightness. Oh she  
remembers us, doubtless notwithstanding her  
infinite joy and Possessiveness she thinks of her stay  
at Alden last summer and her joyful meeting  
with her Beloved Father on her return to us  
They should we mourn for her; it is right to mourn

If you have heard from your Dr. Brown  
I wish you would inform me how it is with him  
I have not had a letter from him since last winter

when you write him as to this tell him father  
lets some on this subject

We love our Dear Heller very much she  
is bright and amiable kind and good  
She is contented and happy she is a good  
scholar attending school every day

All send love to you all Bennett kiss Dear
